Accuracy of grammar and vocabulary.

Vocabulary, grammar and punctuation:

- Conjunctions, including when, if, because, although
- Tenses
- Choosing nouns or pronouns
- Indicating possession by using the possessive apostrophe with plural nouns
- Using and punctuating direct speech

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Year 6

Reading comprehension:

- Discuss and evaluate how authors use language, including figurative language, considering the impact on the reader.
- Distinguish between statements of fact and opinion.
- Retrieve, record and present information from non-fiction
- Explain and discuss a given text
- Provide reasoned justifications for shared views.

Writing composition:

- Use appropriate grammar and vocabulary
- In narratives, describe settings, characters and atmosphere- integrate dialogue to convey character and advance the action.
- Summarizing longer passages.
- using further organisational and presentational devices to structure text and to guide the reader [for example, headings, bullet points, underlining]

Vocabulary, grammar and punctuation:

- Recognise vocabulary and structures that are appropriate for formal speech and writing, including subjunctive forms
- Using passive verbs to affect the presentation of information in a sentence
- Using the perfect form of verbs to mark relationships of time and cause
- Using relative clauses beginning with who, which, where, when, whose,
- Using commas to clarify meaning or avoid ambiguity in writing
- Using hyphens to avoid ambiguity
- Using brackets, dashes or commas to indicate parenthesis
- Using semi-colons, colons or dashes to mark boundaries between independent clauses
- Using a colon to introduce a list
- punctuating bullet points consistently

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
